

# **IR Receiver Modules for Remote Control Systems**

#### Description

The TSOP34#.. series are miniaturized receivers for infrared remote control systems. A PIN diode and a preamplifier are assembled on a lead frame, the epoxy package acts as an IR filter.

The demodulated output signal can be directly decoded by a microprocessor. The TSOP348.. is compatible with all common IR remote control data formats. The TSOP344.. is optimized to suppress almost all spurious pulses from energy saving fluorescent lamps but will also suppress some data signals.

This component has not been qualified according to automotive specifications.







 $R_{_1}$  and  $C_{_1}$  are recommended for protection against EOS. Components should be in the range of 33  $\Omega$  <  $R_{_1}$  < 1 k $\Omega$ ,  $C_{_1}$  > 0.1  $\mu F.$




Figure 1. Output Active Low




Figure 2. Pulse Length and Sensitivity in Dark Ambient





Figure 3. Output Function







Figure 5. Frequency Dependence of Responsivity

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


Figure 7. Sensitivity vs. Supply Voltage Disturbances




Figure 8. Sensitivity vs. Electric Field Disturbances




Figure 9. Max. Envelope Duty Cycle vs. Burst Length




Figure 10. Sensitivity vs. Ambient Temperature





Figure 11. Relative Spectral Sensitivity vs. Wavelength








Figure 13. Sensitivity vs. Supply Voltage

#### Suitable Data Format

The TSOP34#.. series is designed to suppress spurious output pulses due to noise or disturbance signals. Data and disturbance signals can be distinguished by the devices according to carrier frequency, burst length and envelope duty cycle. The data signal should be close to the band-pass center frequency (e.g. 38 kHz) and fulfill the conditions in the table below.

When a data signal is applied to the TSOP34#.. in the presence of a disturbance signal, the sensitivity of the receiver is reduced to insure that no spurious pulses are present at the output. Some examples of disturbance signals which are suppressed are:

- DC light (e.g. from tungsten bulb or sunlight)
- · Continuous signals at any frequency




Figure 14. IR Signal from Fluorescent Lamp with Low Modulation





Figure 15. IR Signal from Fluorescent Lamp with High Modulation

- Strongly or weakly modulated noise from fluorescent lamps with electronic ballasts (see figure 14 or figure 15).



## **Ozone Depleting Substances Policy Statement**

It is the policy of Vishay Semiconductor GmbH to

- 1. Meet all present and future national and international statutory requirements.

- 3. Council Decision 88/540/EEC and 91/690/EEC Annex A, B and C (transitional substances) respectively.
